### **Wednesday, November 8. 15:00-18:00 (3 hours)**

Lecturers: Dr. Fernando Bayón (Social Sciences and Humanities: 1.5 hours) & Dr. Jaime Cuenca (Social Sciences and Humanities: 1.5 hours).

Bring PhD research to the set of merits that are scientifically best evaluated today:

- Management of Impact Papers in JCR/WOS Journals and participation in expert networks worldwide – papers in conferences with quality indicators-
- Competences to be developed: Searching relationships between research topic and scientific area; **mapping journals** and expert networks in the specific area; capacity for scientific transfer;

- Content impact strategy in secondary funding sources (Foundations, European and world grant programmes).
- How to bring coherence to the curricular track through technological platforms that help build a researcher ID, integrated with prioritized curricular items.
- Sharing predoctoral research, training students to build a network of contacts with individual experts, international research groups, institutions and foundations. Competences to be developed for knowledge network:
  - Sharing objectives, processes and results: How to improve research work outreach strategies through network mapping (cultural mapping focused on research);
  - Dialogue with experts, agents and institutions involved;

Lecturers: Dr. Álvaro de la Rica. (Deusto Business School, 2 hours) and Dr. Macarena Cuenca. (Deusto Business School Dept. of Strategy and Information Systems: 2 h.)

- The thesis as a platform for future projects and its relationship with Foundations, etc. How to broaden its outreach through ongoing programmes within the university (Continuing education, etc.) and outside: The relationship with NGOs, International Foundations and businesses: the thesis as an incubator of strategic relationships with business and associations.

- Your PhD Thesis & the Digital Culture: The importance of social platforms, media and networks.

- Publishing in publication series: ranking, positioning, collaborative strategies.
- Project presentation and communication skills; writing scientific reports and collaboration in R+D+I competitive projects.
  - Self-assessment and peer-review management: A classroom session will be devoted to developing group collaborative work to make students familiar with peer review of papers for journals, providing them with practical tools to manage a basic process in positioning research excellence results.
  - Practical exercise: How to turn a research plan into a query letter (letter of interest for international editorial boards). Peer review as a critical collaborative practice: Writing + evaluation + correction

- Big data and algorithms to understand communicative, social, political, economic and processes.

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**Methodology**

The methodology will be eminently participative, very much looking to facilitate networking, combining:

- Combination of lectures with selected readings and manuals. Preparation of exercises based on the academic work of the student and correction. Critical thinking and analysis of academic discourse are needed to develop academic writing skills.
- In deep analysis of case studies
  - how a scientific track and a competitive digital profile are constructed;
  - protocols & applications for research stays abroad;
  - greater expertise in managing tools to look at the scope of a journal or at the ranking of impacts (including the social ones) within a specific field.
- With practical exercises in the room
  - how to write a query letter to pitch an academic book or article to the members of an editorial board or scientific committee;

Strategies to gain familiarity and become better at peer reviewing processes.
